Sustainability

Sustainability is a core mission at Sound Transit. We encourage sustainability by providing affordable, environmentally-friendly travel options that connect people to where they live, work, and play. Delivering our transit projects and services with sustainability and efficiency in mind also means our day-to-day work fosters a healthy environment, community, and economy.

To reflect these values, the agency's Sustainability Plan and annual targets are built around the pillars of people, planet, and prosperity. In 2015 Sound Transit continues to carry out a wide-range of projects, with increasing focus on integrating sustainable design into early planning processes, final design, and construction. Sound Transit recognizes that the decisions we make today will keep sustainability part of our transit systems for years to come.

Sound Transit continues to implement our Sustainability Initiative through our internationally certified (ISO 14001) Environmental and Sustainability Management System (ESMS). The agency also continues to be a transit industry leader through our ongoing participation in APTA's Sustainability Commitment at the platinum recognition level.

Accomplishment and Activities

- Granted Platinum level recognition from the American Public Transportation Association's Sustainability Commitment. Sound Transit is the second transit agency in the nation to receive this distinction, which recognizes the extent to which sustainability is integrated into an organization, the number of sustainability goals completed, and improvement in resource conservation, and other sustainability metrics.
- Received a clean external audit for Sound Transit's ESMS ISO 14001 certification.
- Completed and distributed the 2014 Annual Sustainability Progress Report, and presented to the Board of Directors.
- Released an outreach campaign and video to educate staff about new municipal composting ordinances affecting agency offices; over 80% of staff completed the training.
- Celebrated Earth month by conducting two environmentally-focused tours for staff.
- Conducted a survey with approximately 1,500 contractors on Sound Transit construction projects to better understand sustainability best practices being used in the industry.
- Initiated work on all sustainability targets that were scheduled to be in progress by second quarter.

- Present on sustainability construction best practices at the American Public Transportation Association's Sustainability workshop conference in Portland, OR.
- Draft and finalize an agency Climate Adaptation Strategy.
- Draft and finalize the procedures for implementing the agency's Green Procurement and Utilization Policy.

Overall ridership for Sound Transit increased by 6% over 2014 boardings for the same period.*


Sounder Commuter Rail increased 11%
