
Our six values

Sound Transit District Serving a region of more than 3 million

40% of the state's population



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Approved by voters

1996

Sound Move

Light rail from Westlake to SeaTac/Airport.

Established Sounder from Everett and Tacoma to Seattle.

Established ST Express bus service.

2008

ST2

Light rail to Northgate, Angle Lake, Redmond, Lynnwood, Federal Way.

Sounder expansion to South Tacoma, Lakewood.

ST3

2016

Light rail to Ballard, West Seattle, Everett, Tacoma, Kirkland, Issaquah.

3 bus rapid transit lines.

2 new Sounder stations, more capacity, parking and access improvements.



Voter-approved funding sources

Tax	Total Imposed/Levied
Car tab (MVET)	1.1% (\$110 annually for each \$10,000 of vehicle valuation)
Property tax	\$0.25 annually per \$1,000 of assessed valuation (\$100 annually on a \$400,000 house)
Sales and use tax	1.4% (\$0.14 on a \$10 taxable purchase)
Rental car sales	0.8 percent (\$0.80 on a \$100 car rental)



Governance

Legislative authorization

RCW 81.112 governs regional transit authorities, of which Sound Transit is the only one in Washington.

Board of Directors

- 18-member Board representing all Sound Transit subareas
- Four automatic members:
 - County Executives (Snohomish, Pierce, King)
 - WSDOT Secretary
- 14 appointed members:
 - Minimum one elected representative from largest city within each county (currently Everett, Seattle, and Tacoma)
 - Proportional appointment representing each subarea
 - County executives control appointment process



Current service



Link light rail

- 1 Line: 19 stations from Northgate—Angle Lake.
- T Line: 6 stations from Tacoma Dome–Theater District.
- 2 Line (2023) will serve Northgate-Redmond with nine existing stations + 10 new stations.





Sounder trains

- S Line serving Lakewood–Seattle, N Line serving Everett–Seattle.
- High capacity, weekday peak hours with weekend special event service.
- Speeds up to 79 mph, free from traffic.




ST Express buses

- 24 routes from Everett to DuPont to Issaquah.
- Express service along regional freeway corridors

Current system (2023)

Link light rail

- Two lines
- 25 miles
- 26 stations
- Connecting Northgate–Angle Lake, Tacoma Dome–Theater District

Sounder trains **N**S

- Two lines
- 83 miles
- 12 stations
- Connecting Everett–Seattle and Lakewood–Seattle

ST Express buses

• 24 express routes on regional freeway corridors





System expansion

Link light rail **1234**

- Five lines
- 116 miles
- 83 stations

Sounder trains **N**S

- Two lines
- 91 miles
- 14 stations

Stride bus rapid transit **S1 S2 S3**

- Three lines
- 45 miles on I-405 and SR 522.
- Serving 12 cities and connecting to light rail in Shoreline, Lynnwood, Bellevue and Tukwila.



Under construction

Light rail extensions

Hilltop Tacoma

Extends T Line to Stadium, Hilltop neighborhoods **East Link**

Launches 2 Line from Northgate–Redmond with 10 new stations.

Lynnwood

Extends the 1 & 2 Lines with four new stations.

Federal Way

Extends the 1 Line with three new stations.

Downtown Redmond

Extends the 2 Line with two new stations.











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
