

How we got here

During 2018, Sound Transit started with the representative project included in the Sound Transit 3 (ST3) Plan approved by voters in 2016 and identified potential refinement options based on community feedback and input from local agency partners. The project team then used evaluation criteria and technical analysis to narrow down the potential project refinements and develop the preliminary refined project for the full corridor.

Potential impacts

Sound Transit recognizes that the roadway and intersection improvements being considered along the corridor present the potential for impacts for those living or working close to the project. Project staff will continue to work with property owners and tenants to minimize impacts to the extent possible. Any new information will be communicated as the planning effort progresses. Staff is available to answer questions via phone or email and can meet in-person as well.



Project overview

The State Route 522/NE 145th Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project will provide fast, frequent and reliable transit service between the north Lake Washington communities and the new Shoreline South/145th Link light rail station in 2024. Riders will be able to connect to and transfer to Link light rail, I-405 BRT, and other transit service provided by Sound Transit, Community Transit and King County Metro.

SR 522/NE 145th BRT will run along eight miles of NE 145th Street and SR 522 from the future Link light rail station at I-5 and NE 145th Street in Shoreline to Bothell. Service will run every 10 minutes, all day between Shoreline and Bothell; service continuing to Woodinville will run every 20 minutes. Riders will be able to connect to Link light rail at the Shoreline South/NE 145th station, and to I-405 BRT in Bothell.









Types of refinements the project team considered in 2018

- Station locations.
- Parking locations in Lake Forest Park, Kenmore and Bothell.
- > Roadway improvements for BRT priority, including business access and transit (BAT) lanes, lanes repurposed for transit, bus queue bypass lanes and transit signal priority.
- Access for pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Integration with transit service provided by King County Metro and Community Transit as well as ST Express.
- Location of connection to I-405 BRT.
- BRT service branding.


What we heard

The following high-level themes emerged from the input gathered from the community at public events in the spring and fall of 2018. These comments were taken into consideration as Sound Transit developed the preliminary refined project.

- Support for effective local transit connections and options for non-motorized modes of travel to allow easy access to BRT stations.
- > Support for transit priority improvements to ensure BRT speed and reliability. Suggestions included bus queue bypass lanes and active traffic management during rush hour.
- Concern from property owners along the corridor about the impact of an expanded roadway.
- Support for safe pedestrian walkways and crossings along SR 522, with consideration of where sidewalks would be best utilized.

^{**}The Sound Transit Board may implement provisional station pair(s) based upon the results of Phase 2 assessments in 2019 and identification of funding for station design, construction and operation. The Phase 2 assessment will include land use and zoning, ridership potential, transit integration with King County Metro, non-motorized access and community input.
