Compliance with Title VI calls for these items to be brought before the Sound Transit board for their approval prior to their submission to FTA.

Title VI evaluations help ensure that ST activities do not result in disparate impact discrimination for minority communities or represent a disproportionate burden on low-income populations.



Federal Way Link Extension Service and Fare Equity Report

FWLE Service Equity Report

Equity analyses are required for major service changes including in the implementation of new fixed capital guideways.

The FWLE extends 1 Line service to Federal Way, adding new stations at Kent Des Moines, Star Lake, and Federal Way.

No service-related disparate impacts or disproportionate burdens were found.

Service change adds service without taking away service from any existing routes.



Title VI Service Monitoring Report

Title VI Service Monitoring

Data-driven view of whether the agency is meetings its standards.

Examines various measures for each mode relative to minority and low-income populations.

Required by FTA as part of Title VI compliance and submitted in the Title VI Program as part of the triennial review process.

Methodology cont.

DI/DB thresholds:

A disparate impact (DI) or disproportionate burden (DB) occurs when the percentage of the adversely affected Title VI population in the service area of the line or route exceeds the percentage of the minority or low-income population within the Sound Transit district by at least 5%.

Low-Income

Persons whose household income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty line (in line with ORCA reduced fare payment).

Reasons for Findings

Mitigation Strategies

Employed in current triennial period: strategic service reductions; partner coordination on shared corridors

Near term: East Link and Federal Way extension implementations; consideration of design criteria for Tacoma Link Additional bike locker installations and more active management

Medium term: Implementation of BRT

Long term: ST3 expansion

Ongoing: Commitment to on-going monitoring with focused interdepartmental coordination

A Title VI Program Update is a comprehensive document submitted to the FTA every three years that outlines how the agency ensures nondiscrimination in the delivery of its services

Must be approved by the board prior to submission to FTA

Elements of Title VI Program Update

- Title VI Complaint process and forms
- Recent Title VI investigations, complaints, and lawsuits
- Public Participation Plan
- Language Assistance and Implementation
 Plan
- Minority representation of planning and advisory bodies
- Service Monitoring Report
- Demographic profiles of the service area and ridership
- Documentation of analyses conducted for recent major service and fare changes
- DI/DB Policy
